Noelle Noonan, soprano, is a member of several national honor societies for academics and the arts. She graduated summa cum laude from West Virginia's Bethany College with a BA in Music and French. Ms. Noonan studied French language and culture at La Sorbonne in Paris where she graduated with a Diplôme de la langue française. She was also a voice student at the Conservatoire National de Région de Boulogne-Billancourt where her studio instructor was soprano Liliane Mazeron. She is a soprano section leader and cantor at Saint Olaf Catholic Church in Minneapolis, and also maintains an active private voice studio. She has performed as a guest artist with the Kenwood Symphony Orchestra in the past, and with the Sieur Du Luth Summer Arts Festival in Duluth. Most recently, Ms. Noonan has become a featured performer with the emerging Twin Cities recital group, La Bonne Chanson.

Ramiro Alvarez is a DMA candidate in Cello Performance at the University of Minnesota School of Music. During his master's degree he was also a Teaching Assistant for Mrs. Tanya Remenikova, who is his current teacher. Born in Argentina, he studied at the Cordoba Music Conservatory, where he had the chance to travel overseas to perform representing his school. A recipient of full scholarships, Alvarez studied with Dr. Benjamin Shapira in Wisconsin, and also with Claudio Baraviera and M. Juarez Johnson in Buenos Aires. He has performed at several international festivals including the 2004 Schleswig Holstein Festival in Germany, the 2007 Pacific Music Festival in Sapporo, Japan and at the Verbier Festival and Chamber Orchestra in Switzerland between 2008 and 2011. Mr. Alvarez was also a member of the "Teatro Colon" Academy Orchestra (principal cellist), Cordoba Symphony and the National Symphony Orchestra of Argentina. He spends his time teaching, performing, freelancing and making arrangements for celle groups of "all-time classics" to enjoy with his friends and colleagues.

A native of Minnesota, Jennifer Sylvester graduated from Concordia College, Moorhead, Minnesota, with a BA in Music. Jennifer has pursued her passion for singing by performing with various professional choral ensembles and opera companies. In 2005, Jennifer was the national winner for the American Mothers Vocal Competition. In addition, she has also been a first and second place recipient for the Thursday Musical Advanced Vocal Competition and was awarded a performance grant from the Schubert Club. Jennifer has performed recitals with the Schubert Club Courtroom Concert Series, The Owatonna Arts Center, Noon at the Jimmy Recital in Red Wing Minnesota, and as part of the Lord of Life Music Series in Dallas, Texas. Jennifer has performed as an soloist for the Twin Cities' Exultate Chamber Choir, St. Clement's Episcopal Church of St. Paul, University Lutheran Church of Hope and Grace University combined choirs of Minneapolis, and King of Glory Lutheran Church of Dallas, Texas. Additionally, Jennifer has performed with several opera companies and professional choirs including the Fargo/Moorhead Civic Opera, The Metroplex Opera of Dallas, Texas, the Minnesota Opera Chorus and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra Chorus. Currently Jennifer is pursuing her master's degree in Speech-Language Pathology at the University of Minnesota and teaches early childhood music at MacPhail Center for Music. Jennifer resides in Lino Lakes, Minnesota with her husband, Steve, and two sons, Sam and Charlie.

Pianist **Jiye Kim**, a native of Seoul, Korea, graduated from the Sun Hwa Arts Middle and High School in Seoul. She entered the Sun Hwa Art High School as a top student and achieved excellent performance awards in piano performance for three years. She also performed in the annual winner's concert as a result of winning the concerto competition. Jiye Kim earned her Bachelor of Music degree at Seoul National University. She won several competitions in Korea including the Korean Newspaper Competition, Sun Hwa Arts School Competition, Music Journal Concours, and Korea Piano Study Association Competition.

Christian-Philippe Quilici holds his BA from Harvard College, Cambridge, Massachusetts in Slavic Languages and Literature and a certificate in Modern Languages - Russian and Czech - from St Catherine's College, Oxford University. He has managed to combine his love for classical singing and for Slavic music through numerous Russian and Czech music recitals at both Harvard and Oxford as well as in his native Los Angeles and in St. Petersburg, Russia. He is a founding member of the Harvard Early Music Society wherein he sang Monteverdi's Nero for their inaugural season. Christian-Philippe currently studies with Audrey Stottler.

For over 15 years, **Keith Hilson** has been performing as a freelance trombonist in the Twin Cities, Wisconsin, and throughout the Upper Midwest, contributing his unique and wide ranging musical gifts to a variety of ensembles and events. A graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire with a BME-Instrumental Music and an alumnus of the nationally recognized UW-Eau Claire Jazz Ensemble One, Keith has been noted for his technique, range and tone as a trombonist as well as his stylistic accuracy and musicality. Through his studies, Keith has developed a playing style as equally suited to symphony orchestras as jazz combos. Now based in Eagan, Minnesota, Keith is currently studying for his Masters in Trombone Performance at the University of Minnesota-Twin Cities under Professor Tom Ashworth.

Wisconsin native Carolyn Cavadini is a vibrant and versatile soprano who is growing exponentially with each new operatic endeavor. Most recently, she performed the role of Mozart heroine Donna Anna at the Sieur Du Luth Opera Program and presented her Master's of Music Recital at the University of Minnesota. Ms. Cavadini has a wide variety of stage experience that includes opera, musical theatre, and concert work. She has performed full roles and scenes which include Marschallin (*Der Rosenkavalier*), Alice Ford (*Falstaff*), Donna Elvira (*Don Giovanni*), Ellen Orford (*Peter Grimes*), and Adriana Lecourvrer (*Adriana Lecourvrer*). Ms. Cavadini attended the Operafestival di Roma in 2005 where she performed 3rd Lady in their mainstage production of *Die Zauberflöte*. In order to continue to be a well-rounded performer, Ms. Cavadini has also enjoyed portraying Lily (*The Secret Garden*) and has been chosen as a featured soloist for the Spring Campus Orchestra Concert at the University of Minnesota in March. Upcoming, Ms. Cavadini can be seen as Rosalinda in the University of Minnesota's production of *Die Fledermaus*.

Pianist Sophie Christian was born in Indonesia and began piano studies at age four under the tutelage of her Mother, Sri Suliani Leo. At age six, she enrolled at Lembaga Musik Murni to continue her musical training and obtained her Performance Diploma with High Distinction. After finishing high school, she pursued advanced studies in the United States, earning a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance with High Honors from the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor, and Master of Music in Piano Performance and Performer's Diploma from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University, where she was awarded the Dean's Scholarship. At Indiana, she was also an instructor for the Young Pianist program. Her collegiate teachers were Sean Brett Duggan, Christopher Harding, and Reiko Neriki. Sophie is currently completing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Minnesota, studying with concert planist Lydia Artymiw. Awarded a teaching assistantship, she serves as a Graduate Instructor for undergraduate-level class piano at the University of Minnesota. So far, she has performed four successful Doctoral recitals, appeared at the annual University of Minnesota Collage concert at Ted Mann Concert Hall and at the Bravo! Institute and has played collaborative recitals at Ultan Recital Hall, The Landmark Center, and Antonello Hall of the MacPhail Center for Music. A dedicated teacher, she also serves on the faculty of St. Joseph's School of Music, St. Paul, and as Adjunct Faculty at Inver Hills Community College, Inver Grove Heights. Last year, she was invited to be an adjudicator of a national piano competition in Indonesia. In addition to her solo recitals, Sophie performed the Liszt Second Piano Concerto with the Indiana University Orchestra and was also a prize-winner and finalist at the University of Michigan Concerto Competition, Jakarta Piano Competition, and North Sumatra Piano Competition. She has received scholarships to study and perform at the Piano Texas International Academy & Festival in Fort Worth, Texas, and at the Bowdoin International Music Festival in Brunswick, Maine.

Soprano Corissa Leonard is a native of Wisconsin and graduated in May with a Master's of Music in Vocal Performance at Rice University, Houston, where she was a student of Kathleen Kaun. Most recently Ms. Leonard traveled to Germany to perform the role of Despina in Così fan tutte at the Lyric Opera Studio of Weimar. Other opera credits include Zerbinetta (prologue of Ariadne auf Naxos) and Nella (Gianni Schicchi) with the Shepherd School of Music, Barbarina (Le nozze di Figaro) with the Lyric Opera Studio of Weimar, and Mrs. Gleaton (Susannah) with the Janiec Opera Company at the Brevard Music Center. Scene performances with the Shepherd School of Music include Marie (La Fille du Régiment) Sophie (Der Rosenkavalier), Clorinda (La Cenerentola), and Giulietta (I Capuletti e i Montecchi). She completed her Bachelor of Music degree in Vocal Performance at DePaul University, Chicago in 2006, where she was a student of Amy Conn and Elizabeth Gottlieb. In 2009 Ms. Leonard was a winner of the Harold A. Levin Scholarship from the Civic Music Association of Milwaukee Collegiate Music Competition. Currently Ms. Leonard is singing with the Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra Chorus and this is her first time performing with the Kenwood Symphony Orchestra.

Yuri Ivan became the Music Director of the Kenwood Symphony Orchestra in 2007. He completed his formal music training in Ukraine where his main teachers were Jarema Skybinky amd Mykola Kolessa. Mr. Ivan also studied with Yuri Simonov, Adalberto Tonnini, Vjacheslav Blinov and Yuri Lutsiv. After graduating from The State Conservatory of Music in Lviv, he was engaged from 1996 to 2000 as an Associate Conductor at The State Theatre of Opera and Ballet in Dnepropetrovsk, Ukraine, where he conducted productions including *The Marriage of Figaro, Rigoletto, La Traviata, Carmen, Pagliacci, Eugene Oneguine, Die Fledermaus, La Fille Mal Gardée, Giselle, Don Quixote, Swan Lake* and Sleeping Beauty. In 2001, Mr. Ivan was named Artistic Director of Trans-Carpathian Philharmonic, co-founded the Uzhgorod Youth Orchestra and the Young Virtuosi music festival in Ukraine. He also appeared with LVMI Opera, the National Symphony-Pops Orchestra of Ukraine, the National Broadcasting Company Orchestra of Ukraine and the Northern Hungarian Symphony. Recently, Mr. Ivan completed his doctoral studies in conducting at the University of Minnesota where he studied with Akira Mori and Craig Kirchhoff. Currently, he is the Music Director at St. Constantine Ukrainian Catholic Church. Mr. Ivan is active in the artistic life of the Twin Cities metro area, collaborating with a range of artistic and educational organizations. Since 2006, Yuri Ivan has served as the Music Director of the Lynden Hills Chamber Orchestra.

The Kenwood Symphony Orchestra was founded as the Kenwood Chamber Orchestra in 1972 as an adult education class at the Kenwood Community Center. From those humble beginnings, the orchestra quickly grew in membership, ability, and reputation. Over the years, several gifted conductors have graced the podium, including Uri Barnea, Lee Humphries, Jim Riccardo, Jeannine Wager, William Intriligator, Myles Hernandez, Kenneth Freed, and Jeffrey Stirling. Since September, 2007, the orchestra has been under the direction of Yuri Ivan. Based at Ramsey International Fine Arts Center, the KSO represents over 50 highly accomplished volunteer musicians of all ages and occupations including students, working professionals, and retirees, all passionate about playing and sharing great music. In 2003, the KSO launched an exciting venture joining Ramsey IFAC and the New England Conservatory to integrate music into the mainstream curriculum. The KSO is a nonprofit organization financed primarily by members' dues, financial gifts from friends and supporters, and our annual Masters Concerto and Aria event. The Masters Concerto and Aria Competition (MCAC) was originally created by the KSO to serve as a unique opportunity for adult amateur musicians over the age of 30 to compete with their peers for the chance to perform with an orchestra. Several years ago the minimum age was lowered to 25 and we soon found the competition attracting musicians in the midst of masters or doctoral studies. This had us pondering what it truly means to be an "amateur" and starting with our 12th annual competition we created a second category for the 'Emerging Professional'. Tonight we are pleased to present the top three competitors from the Amateur category and the top six competitors from the Emerging Professional category. ~ About the Competition Judges ~

Michael Lien grew up in Litchfield, Minnesota and went on to attend the University of Minnesota where he graduated with B.S. and M.A. degrees in Music Education. He has taught instrumental music in Delano, Apple Valley, Burnsville, West Berlin – Germany, and finally at Centennial High School. The Lien family spent most of the 1980s in West Berlin where Michael had been hired to establish an American-styled band program in the Berlin public schools. During his last two years at Centennial, Mr. Lien served as Vice-President of the Minnesota Music Educators Association in charge of band activities for the State of Minnesota. Mr. Lien retired from teaching in June of 2009. He continues to be active in music as a trumpet player and as a guest conductor. Mr. Lien's wife, Kathryn, is also a musician and he has an adult son and daughter (both married) and one wonderful grandchild. The Liens live in White Bear Lake.

A performer of immense talent and style, **Dennis Petersen's** extensive career includes regular guest artist performances with numerous major opera houses and regional theaters, including Metropolitan Opera, New York City Opera, San Francisco Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Seattle Opera, Opera Pacific, Florida Grand Opera, Minnesota Opera, Spoleto Festivals and Saito Kinen Festivals.
